She has cargo and passengers for this port, together with the moorings for the roadstead, and advice of her arrival at Nelson may be hourly expected.

The 'Inchinnan' arrived at New Plymouth from Nelson about the 1st instant, and sailed for Shanghai on the 18th. During the interval she had to go to sea and return more than once – losing, on one occasion, an anchor and 65 fathoms of chain.

“Alice and Jane Appoo arrived on the ‘Inchinnan’ from London after a terrible voyage. Twelve crew members were imprisoned or discharged on arrival. The captain went overboard through his cabin porthole and was lost on the way to Shanghai. A new captain was engaged at Sydney but the crew was insolent to him also. The passengers must have been very glad to step ashore on 19 May 1856.”

Item 56/195 James W. Macdonald, Nelson Emigration Office, 55 King William Street, London 15 Dec 1855 to the Superintendent, Nelson
Sir, I have the honor to inform you that I addressed your Honor on the 18th of November last by the 'Southern Cross' via Otago and Wellington, and stated "that a vessel, (name a present unknown) of about 500 tons would be despatched to Nelson direct by Messrs Willis, not later than the 20th of December next." I have now to report to your Honor that the name of the ship is the 'Inchinnan' and her date of sailing is, as soon after the 8th of January next (on which day the passengers are to embark), as possible. She will bring from 70 to 80 adults, and those selected by me are useful persons, have good characters, and will, I have every reason to believe, give satisfaction to the Commissioners...

- Point No.6 I endeavoured to get the 'Inchinnan' despatched in the middle of November, but they informed me that they could not fill a ship at that time, and so, from the middle of December, the original date of sailing, the time has been extended to the 8th of January, on which day the Emigrants are to embark. This delay has been injurious to the Passengers, but, I must add, under the existing system, it is unavoidable.
- Point No.10 Those persons in Somerset who had promised me that they would go out by the 'Inchinnan' have dropped off at the last, one by one for want of an outfit. I enclose a letter received from one of them. I am glad to say Mr Tytler has at length consented to make an advance for outfit when absolutely necessary.
- Point No.24 I have appointed a very respectable young man named George Watson as Schoolmaster in the 'Inchinnan', and have informed him that he will have a free passage in consideration of his services. He possesses excellent testimonials.

She was born at Hackney, Middlesex, England in 1853 and came out to Nelson with her parents in the barque 'Inchinnan' in 1856. She married Mr H. Batchelor, who died 49 years ago. There were seven children, Mrs F. Percival (Wellington), Mrs A. Elder (Auckland), Mrs F. Black (Stratford), Messrs Hugh Batchelor (Napier), G. and C. Batchelor (Nelson), W. Batchelor (Dunedin). - Ann Doidge 06 Nov 1908: "Mrs Ann Doidge, of Stoke, celebrated her 97th birthday on Wednesday last, she having been born in 1811. Mrs Doidge arrived in Nelson in the 'Inchinnan' in 1856, and after a short stay went on to Taranaki. At the time of the trouble with the Maoris Mrs Doidge returned to Nelson, and has remained in this district ever since. Until recently Mrs Doidge had enjoyed a full measure of health."³⁵
- John Doidge 08 Dec 1908: "Yesterday, Mrs Ann Doidge passed away at the residence of her son-in-law (Mr James Ching) at Stoke, being in her 98th year. Deceased arrived with her husband (the late Mr John Doidge) at Nelson in 1856. Afterwards they resided for a time in Taranaki until the refugees were sent to Nelson in 1860, when the Maori war became serious and it was deemed prudent to remove the women and children. The settlers at that time were subject to night alarms, and had to take refuge in the churches and other buildings, it being too dangerous for them to remain in their houses. Deceased has since resided in Stoke. Her kindly disposition won for her the respect of all who had the honour of her acquaintance. She leaves three sons, two daughters, 27 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren."³⁶
