Bristol Mirror 28 Jun 1828 Anti-Slavery Meeting

At a Meeting of the Inhabitants of Bristol and its Vicinity, held in the Guildhall, on the 20th June, 1828, W. P. Taunton, Esq., in the Chair; The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:- 1st That the state of Slavery in the British Colonies is supported at a vast annual expense of Money, and waste of Human Life; and that its continuance is at once opprobrious to the National Character, and inconsistent with the precepts of Christianity. 2nd That the Resolution of the House of Commons "That it is expedient to adopt decisive and effectual measures for meliorating the condition of the Slave Population of his Majesty's Colonies," was, with reason, hailed as the commencement of a new era in our Colonial Government, in which the impolitic, degrading, and unchristian condition of Slavery would be gradually meliorated, and ultimately exchanged for the employment of Free labourers. 3rd That, as the very temperate and judicious instructions issued by the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department had been previously considered, and (with the exception of only one article) approved by a Committee of West India Planters, resident in this country, no doubt remains that those Instructions were perfectly consistent with the real interest of the Planters, and the security of their property. 4th That it is cause of extreme surprise and pain, to learn that the instructions issued by the Colonial Secretary, have, in only a few instances, been even partially and imperfectly complied with; whilst in the majority of the Colonial Assemblies, the instructions of the British Government, and the authority of Parliament, have been opposed and rejected. 5th That a Petition, in accordance with the foregoing Resolutions, be presented to each House of Parliament; and that, by leave of the Mayor, copies of the same be left for Signature at the Guildhall and the Exchange, under the direction of the Requisitionists, who are requested to cause the Petition to be presented. 6th That the cordial Thanks of this Meeting be presented to the Right Worshipful the Mayor, for his kindness in granting the use of the Hall. 7th That the cordial Thanks of this Meeting be given to W. P. Taunton, Esq., Chairman, for his very able and impartial conduct in the Chair. The Petition will lie for Signature until Saturday, the 28th inst., at the Exchange; in the Upper and Lower Arcades; at Naish and Co.'s. 4 Castle-Street; at Mr Moon's, 7 Bath-Street; at T. D. Clarke's, 17 St Michael's-Hill; and at Isaac Selfe's 42 Old Market-Street.

Bristol Mercury 25 May 1830

On Monday next, if the weather be favourable, about 1600 of the children belonging to the Wesleyan Sunday-Schools in this city and its vicinity, will meet in Queen-Square, at a quarter before nine o'clock in the morning, and proceed from thence to Ebenezer Chapel, King-Street, where a Sermon will be preached by the Rev. Jonathan Edmondson, A.M.; and one hundred of the scholars publicly rewarded. Tickets of admission, price 1s each, may be had on that day at Mr Brices, Cabinet Maker, King-Street. In the evening, at seven o'clock, the Rev William Thorpe will preach a Sermon in the same Chapel, on the important duties of Sunday-School Teachers. The Teachers of the Wesleyan Schools will as usual occupy the larger part of the gallery. To the pews below, and to all other parts of the chapel, the teachers of other Sunday-Schools will be admitted by tickets, which may be obtained, gratis, on application to their respective superintendents, or to Messrs N. Lomas, Printer, Castle-Street; J. Wansbrough, Printer, Redcliff-Street; and T. D. Clark, Bookseller, Saint Michael's Hill. At half-past six o'clock the doors will be opened for the admission of the public. Collections will be made in aid of the funds of the Wesleyan Sunday-Schools.

Bristol Mercury 20 Sep 1831 Sunday School Jubilee – Anniversary of the Birth of R. Raikes, Esq.

The Sunday School Jubilee, in commemoration of the birth of the founder of Sunday Schools, took place in our city on Wednesday last; on which occasion the children of the various schools in the Union, amounting in number to about 2,500, assembled at Castle-Green Chapel, where they were addressed by the Rev Wm. Thorpe; and in the evening, a Public Meeting was held at the Baptist Chapel in King-street, on which occasion Stephen Prust, Esq. was called to the chair... At the close of the proceedings the collection was found to amount to ten guineas only, when Mr Prust, expressing his regret at the smallness of the amount, offered, with his characteristic generosity, to subscribe five guineas from his own pocket, provided the gentlemen of the Committee would engage to collect a similar sum from the friends of education. We have no doubt this liberal challenge will be met as liberally, and we hope the result will more than double the collection. In the mean time we have great pleasure in stating that any subscription, in aid of this benevolent purpose, will be thankfully received by Mr T. D. Clark, bookseller, St Michael's Hill.
