New Zealand Mail 25 Nov 1903 Weddings McIlvride-Maplesden

On Wednesday last, at St Peter's Church, Mr John McIlvride, of the electrical branch of the Government Railway Department, was married to Miss Florence Ellen Maplesden, the eldest daughter of Mr C. Maplesden, of Wellington. The bride who was given away by her father, looked very sweet in a dreamy dress of the softest white silk, that clung to her exquisite figure in languorous folds. A shower bouquet was carried, and the usual veil and orange blossoms was worn. Her sisters, Miss Madge and Miss Lottie, attired also in white silk, with burnt straw hats, adorned with white chiffon and scarlet geraniums, were the bridesmaids. The Rev G. P. Davy performed the ceremony. The presents included some silver goods from the bridegroom's brother officers of a useful and ornamental character.
